Steps/Activities by the Teacher:

- •Introduce the Topic Overview article to explain the current issue. Students can read together or individually and then answer the introductory questions.
- •Students should then read articles concerning the issue and complete the C.E.R. chart for **each** article.
- •(Optional) Teachers can choose their own articles on Fast Fashion or use the ones linked in the activity
- •To continue their research students should further explore the Topic Guide on the issue of Fast Fashion.
- •Students should then complete their own C.E.R. chart with their own opinion.
- •Extended: Students can then write their own viewpoint essay concerning whether Fast Fashion should be further regulated by the United States Government.

Article:	
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A statement that answers a question, or the main point, the article's thesis. Example: People are happier in wealthy countries. Information to support the claim. Example: Surveys taken in multiple countries show that people in wealthy countries rate their happiness as higher. Explains how the evidence supports the claim. Example: Since the people surveyed in wealthy countries consistently rate themselves higher in happiness than poorer countries, the wealth of a country is a factor
