2. How has Angie Thomas's work contributed to discussions about racial justice and the experiences of marginalized communities? How do you think she navigates the responsibility of accurately representing marginalized communities while also telling a compelling and engaging story?
From Your Own Knowledge and Experiences:
1. Have you ever read a book or watched a movie that addresses social justice issues or explores themes of racial inequality? If so, what impact did it have on you? If not, what are your expectations or assumptions about such stories?
2. What do you know about the Black Lives Matter movement? Have you participated in any discussions or activities related to this movement? How do you think literature can contribute to conversations about racial justice?



3. How do you think young people can contribute to social change and have their voices heard? Can you think of any examples from real life or other stories where young individuals played a significant role in advocating for justice?
4. What are some stereotypes or misconceptions you have encountered regarding marginalized communities? How do you think these stereotypes can impact individuals' experiences and shape societal attitudes?
5. How can stories help foster empathy, understanding, and dialogue? What role do you think <i>The Hate U Give</i> might play in promoting awareness and sparking conversations about racial injustice?
