## Lateral Reading

## What is lateral reading?

Lateral reading is a **critical thinking technique** used to evaluate the **credibility** and **reliability** of online information. Unlike traditional vertical reading, which involves focusing solely on the content of a single source, lateral reading involves **gathering information from various sources** and making informed judgments about the credibility and accuracy of the information being presented.

When employing lateral reading, individuals typically **open multiple browser tabs or windows to search for additional information about the source**, **the author**, and **the claims** made within the content. This approach allows for a broader understanding of the topic and helps identify potential biases or misinformation.
