TEACHER DIRECTIONS

"The Masque of the Red Death" by Edgar Allan Poe - Reading and Vocabulary

- Read the short story "The Masque of the Red Death" by Edgar Allan Poe. You might choose to do this as a class, in small groups, or individually.
- While reading, have students define the vocabulary terms. **Remember**: You can highlight a word in Gale and select "**define**".

"The Masque of the Red Death" by Edgar Allan Poe - Questions and Map

- After reading the short story "The Masque of the Red Death" by Edgar Allan Poe, have students view the video "How Fictional Pandemics Reflect the Real Thing" in Gale In Context: Literature and answer the corresponding questions.
- Students will then answer the reading comprehension questions based on the text. **Tip**: Have them cite their answers and text evidence using the <u>Highlights and Notes</u> feature built into *Gale in Context: Literature*. Once students make their annotations, they can share via Google Drive or Microsoft OneDrive!
- After answering the comprehension questions, students will design their own map representing the abbey in the story. They will cite text evidence and provide quotes for design elements specifically stated in the text.

Questions - Video (Answers will vary, but some example answers are provided below)

Questions - Comprehension (Answers will vary, but some example answers are provided below)

- 1. The setting is a secluded abbey with seven colored rooms, representing the stages of life. The abbey's isolation and the presence of the Red Death outside create a sense of confinement and impending doom, contributing to the atmosphere of dread.
- 2. The seven rooms symbolize the stages of life and the passage of time. They represent the illusion of control and the inevitability of death. Each room is progressively darker, symbolizing the progression towards death and the futility of escaping it.

- 3. Prince Prospero is motivated by his desire to escape the Red Death and preserve his own life. He takes shelter in the abbey, isolating himself from the suffering outside. His actions reflect human arrogance as he believes he can defy death and protect himself from the inevitable.
- 4. Poe uses vivid imagery and symbolism to depict death in the form of the Red Death and the clock. The imagery of the masked figure and the decaying corpse in the final room emphasizes the inescapability and finality of death.
- 5. The masked figure symbolizes the presence of the Red Death and represents death itself. Its sudden appearance and mysterious nature contribute to the atmosphere of terror, reminding the characters of their mortality and imminent demise.
- 6. The clock symbolizes the passage of time and the ticking of one's life nearing its end. Its chiming interrupts the festivities, serving as a reminder of mortality and instilling a sense of unease and foreboding in the characters and the overall mood.
- 7. Poe builds suspense and tension through foreshadowing, hinting at the impending doom through descriptions of the Red Death and the abbey's isolation. He also uses pacing to create a sense of urgency and increasing tension as the story progresses towards its climax.
- 8. The isolation of Prince Prospero and his guests creates a false sense of security and separates them from the suffering outside. However, this isolation ultimately leads to their downfall as they cannot escape the reach of the Red Death, highlighting the theme of the inevitability of death.
- 9. The characters' actions and choices reflect their moral values or lack thereof. Prince Prospero's selfishness and disregard for others' suffering demonstrate a lack of morality, while the masked figure's presence serves as a moral reminder of the consequences of their actions.
- 10. Through "The Masque of the Red Death," Poe conveys the message that death is inevitable and cannot be escaped, regardless of one's wealth or status. He criticizes human arrogance and the futile attempts to defy death, emphasizing the transience of life and the need to confront the reality of mortality.
