TEACHER DIRECTIONS

“The Tell-Tale Heart” by Edgar Allan Poe – Reading and Questions

- Read the short story “The Tell-Tale Heart” by Edgar Allan Poe. You might choose to do this as a class, in small groups, or individually.
- After reading, have students answer the comprehension questions using evidence from the text.
- Tip: Remember the [Highlights and Notes](#) feature built into *Gale in Context: Middle School*. This is a great way to cite text evidence! Once students make their annotations, they can [share via Google Drive or Microsoft OneDrive](#)!

“The Tell-Tale Heart” by Edgar Allan Poe – Think-Tac-Toe

- In this activity, students will choose 3 options from the board – completing three-in-a row like in the game tic-tac-toe. They can choose to go down, across, or diagonal.
- The center of the board is a “free choice” meaning they can select any option from the board to use that space.
- Tip: Consider having them cite their sources when *using Gale In Context: Middle School* for their research!
