

Utilize these instructions and the fillable activity on the next page to build a customized Gale In Context Vs. Google activity for your students.

ACTIVITY GOAL

Guide students in comparing and contrasting the research experiences of your Gale In Context resources and Google.

STEP ONE: ENTER YOUR RESOURCE INFORMATION

- Enter the resource you want students to use in the fillable spot of the directions (example: Gale In Context: Opposing Viewpoints or Gale In Context: Middle School).
- If students are unfamiliar with how to access the resources, consider having a separate instruction sheet on where they can find the link (on your website or in your LMS) and what password they should use.
- **Here's a tip**: If you have more than one Gale In Context resource that you would like your students to utilize, direct them to your main resource landing point and let them choose which resource best suits their topic.

STEP TWO: LET STUDENTS EXPLORE

- Provide students with a copy of the activity. Each cell within the graph is fillable for virtual use, or you can print hard copies and have students complete the activity that way.
- Extend the activity: Once your students have completed the activity, take the time to work through your Gale resource with them (if you haven't already). This is a great time to show them tools like **Highlights** and Notes, Citation, and Send To.
